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FROM AN ELDER

Acts 5:12-14, 17-20 - Now many signs and wonders were regularly done among the people by the hands of the apostles. And they were all together in Solomon's Portico. None of the rest dared join them, but the people held them in high esteem. And more than ever believers were added to the Lord. multitudes of both men and women ... But the high priest rose up, and all who were with him (that is, the party of the Sadducees), and filled with jealousy they arrested the apostles and put them in the public prison. But during the night an angel of the Lord opened the prison doors and brought them out, and said, "Go and stand in the temple and speak to the people all the words of this Life." You've probably seen the game Whack-a-Mole. Plastic moles come up out of holes in the game surface, and your job as a player is to whack them on the head with a hammer, forcing them back into their holes. Of course, they never stay gone forever—as soon as you whack one mole, you can count on it coming right back.

The Jewish religious leaders in Jerusalem must have felt like they were playing a game of Whack-a-Mole. First, there was Jesus, healing and teaching and becoming vastly popular with the people. They arrested Him and put Him to death. But now Jesus was back again, in the person of His disciples. They also were teaching and healing, and "the people held them in high esteem. And more than ever believers were added to the Lord, multitudes of both men and women." What could they do? The same thing they did the first time—they arrested the

disciples, just like Jesus. But again, it didn't work. An angel came and opened the doors to their prison, sending them to the temple to start teaching about Jesus again! It must have been incredibly frustrating for the priests. But I imagine it was rather hard on the disciples as well. They were not idiots. They knew perfectly well that the last time the priests got this jealous of anyone, He wound up crucified. But it didn't stop them. They continued to teach others about Jesus. How could they do that, when they knew the price they might pay for it? Only in one way—by putting their trust in Jesus, laying the whole weight of their fears on Him. Most of us don't live under the same sort of persecution the disciples did. And yet sometimes we, too, feel like we are on the receiving end of a Whack-a-Mole hammer. We run into temptation after temptation. Trials afflict us—disease, death, loss of work or home or friendships. Just keeping going as a Christian can sometimes be incredibly hard. We think we're finally getting somewhere, and then BAM! The hammer comes down again. What can we do in this situation? Exactly the same thing as the disciples did. We can throw our whole weight of trust onto Jesus our Savior—not trying to handle things ourselves, but totally leaning on Him for help. He knows what it is like to suffer and be weary. He loved us enough to die for us. He will certainly help us. **THE PRAYER**: Dear Lord, help me when the troubles of my life become too much. The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod Stewardship Ministry Newsletter Article – May 2019

Stewardship is not just about giving money to the church. It includes this, to be sure, but it is not limited to it. Stewardship involves our whole life – everything we have and everything we are.

Let us not, though, fall into the trap of thinking that because we give of ourselves in one area we can neglect giving in another. Stewardship is not stealing from Peter to pay Paul. It is not a game we play whereby we justify ourselves in not giving a tenth of our income because we have given in some other way. This is why our Lord warns:

"Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others." (Matthew 23:23)

We are given to do both – tithe of ourselves and what we have. And so it is that St. Paul makes his appeal to us:

"I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:1-2)

We are to present our bodies as a living sacrifice to God. We are not to have the mind of the world, where we exchange equal weight of this for an equal weight of that, and then think that we have done what God has required.

Our whole life is given over for service in and for the Church of God. This is to be done in thanksgiving for what God in Christ has accomplished for us. This is our spiritual worship, the reasonable response to what He has done for us – not one for the other, but all in all.

But what does this look like? St. Paul never lays down a general principle without also giving us some practical application of what shape that principle is to take concretely. He gives the general principle that our bodies are to be living sacrifices to God, and, after admonishing those who have been given particular gifts of grace to serve the church, St. Paul then speaks generally of what is expected of all. He says:

"Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good. Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor. Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality." (Romans 12:9-13)

This is what it looks like to present your bodies as living sacrifices. This is how we live out the grace of God here in time.

Let us then heed the apostle's teaching. Let us present our bodies – everything that we have and everything that we are – as living sacrifices to God, our reasonable response to what God in Christ Jesus accomplished for us by His death and resurrection.

Through this we have forgiveness of sins, a new life in Christ, and eternal salvation. And through this worship, the grace of God is made manifest in His saints – for the church and the world.

Of course all donations are welcome (like cake mixes, icing, condiments, etc.), but this provides an idea of their specific needs. As discussed at our meeting, here are the items for Peace to place an emphasis on, by month. January – soup or stew, February – crackers, March – Mac & Cheese, April – canned meats, May – canned vegetables, June – flour & sugar, July flour & sugar (again), August – Peanut butter, September – canned fruit, October – pork & beans, November – dry pasta, and December – beans.

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Watching television is not a common occurrence in our household, but when an evening is set-aside for "movie night," we usually pick something on Netflix. Now I can watch a western, drama, suspense, horror, sci-fi, or any type of film you can imagine and never judge its content, unless it is religious. For some reason I have to put on my faith filters during a movie, that has anything to do with God or the church. What am I afraid of? Am I impassioned that I might have to defend God, or fear an unhappy conclusion? Anyway there I sat, watching this film about the life of an energetic Pastor leading a prosperous congregation, until he felt God revealed to him there was no Hell. The events leading up to the point of him loosing his church were filled with great drama and debates, climaxing eventually with his return and starting another congregation. This movie was not on my list of great movies, but it got me to thinking about how that spiritual mole creates meaninglessness in Christ's coming. Is there a Hell? Yes, look in the Bible, Matthew 3:12, 13:41-42, 24:51, Mark 9:43, John 3:18-20, Jude 1:7, and Revelation 14:10-11, 21:8. I hate to be the bearer of bad news, but Satan will appear beautiful and tempting. "Satan himself is transformed into an angel of light" (2 Corinthians 11:14). Satan will sway you with his lies (John 8:44) blinds the minds of unbelievers (2 Corinthians 4:4) comes as false apostles (2 Corinthians 11:13-15). Therefore, we need to be constantly on guard and deeply rooted in scripture to battle these schemes of the devil. To make this an extra sad movie was the fact that it was a true story. To me it was an awakening, It is our responsibility toward fellow Christians to set fallen saints straight, who are on the edge of diverting from the truth (James 5:19-20). Satan has proven he is "more cunning than any beast of the field" (Genesis 3:1). Lord, give us the wisdom to know the truth through your word. Protect us against temptations and deliver us from the evil one. For this we give you thanks Lord, for your steadfast love endures forever. Amen.
